

Back to School!

October 10, 106 children started sixth grade in our four classes operating in Lelouma Prefecture in the Labe Region of Guinea. Schools such as ours are needed in Guinea, as only about 53% of 7- to 13-year-olds nationwide have a school to attend.

At the end of sixth grade, students take the "middle school entrance" test. If they pass, they have a chance to attend middle school. Guinea's educators, students and parents were shocked when only 17% of sixth-grade students passed the June 2022 exam. While none of our students took this test, we want a better outcome. Toward that end, we are seeking recommendations from our local educational supervisors on how we can support our sixth graders in this preparation.

WHAT'S NEXT? Launching new schools in 2023

FUND A TEACHER will seek new villages who lack teachers (but have facilities to host classrooms) for our next 2023–2029 project. Our advisors and board members will use the original criteria plus add "lessons learned" from our 2017–2023 experience in Lelouma.

Based on our track record and Guinea's inflation, we project a cost of \$6,115 for 50 students entering first grade in 2023–24 (the first-grade cost is higher due to one-time cost of table benches). By the end of sixth grade, for this cohort, we project a total cost of \$27,747 (if one well and one latrine are added for the village, the total cost for 6 years will be \$31,447.

Two students share their aspirations

Teachers interviewed two 13-year-old students—one in Darou Salam and the other in Tondon, two of our village schools. Passing the national sixth-grade test can open the door to more education. For their part, these two students said they'd come to school with their homework and assignments completed, on time, and do more out-ofclass reading. Their hopes for the future? One wants to be a nurse or medical doctor. The other aspires to be a political leader.

Several photos we reviewed revealed some students without shoes, although every student received a free school uniform. Climate changes, geopolitical unrest, poverty have all impacted our students. Many families have left the area and moved to Senegal or a more populated urban area. At 48%, our retention rate is nothing to brag about but reflects the impact of outside forces on these fragile families.



Why Invest in Guinea?

Guinea, Africa and the world, will need the leaders that we are cultivating today. Our 13-year-old students, for example, will be 40 years old in 2050, when Africa's population will have almost doubled to 2.8 billion. Limiting climate change, global economy and the health of the African continent is at stake, according to author, Edward Paice, *Youthquake: Why Africa's Demography Should Matter to the World*.
